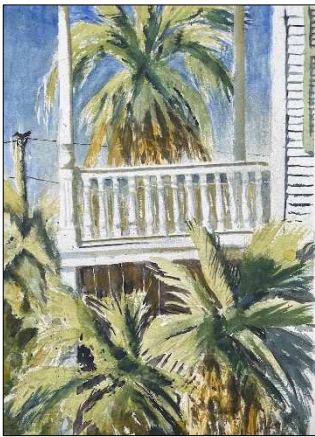

Leroy spent his career as a marine engineer, which accounts for his interest in maritime history and nautical subject matter seen in many of his paintings. He paints in oils and watercolors, plein air and studio. Leroy is active in the Galveston Art League and sits on the board as Member Show Director. He is also a member of Oil Painters of America, Outdoor Painters Society, Southwest Plein Air Artists, American Society of Marine Artists and National Society of Artists.

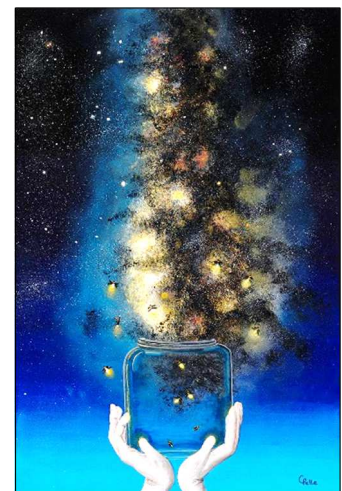

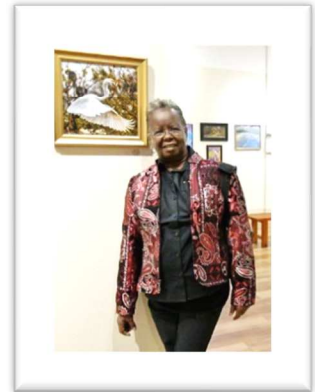

Gay Paratore

January 10, 1940 – March 10, 2025

Mary Gay Garrigan Paratore joined the Galveston Art League when she was just thirteen years old. She continued to show her works at the GAL gallery for the rest of her life. Gay was born in Galveston. She received her bachelor's degree from Sam Houston State University and a master's from the University of Houston.



Gay taught art at area public schools and mentored students participating in the annual Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo art competition. She was head of the art department at Alvin Community College. Among her numerous community activities and contributions, Gay also taught art to adults with mental and physical challenges.

Gay founded the National Society of Artists in 1958. Among numerous recognitions of her work were receipt of the President's Award from the National Watercolor Society and Best of Show from the National Society of Artists.

Larry Jantzen

August 6, 1945 – February 16, 2025



Larry Jantzen contributed to the success of too many to count Galveston Art League functions with his amazingly beautiful and creative floral arrangements. He was born in San Jose, California. Music was a major focus of his family life and Larry and his brother and sister frequently performed religious songs at area churches and on radio and television.

After serving in the Air Force, Larry returned to California and began his career in floral design and opened a flower shop in Oakland. In 1976 he moved to Texas to attend the University of Houston where he earned a bachelor of fine arts in design. His career in Galveston was launched with his successful creation of dried flower wreaths for sale at Dickens on the Strand. He opened the Galveston Wreath Company, later the Galveston Flower Company, and his hand-made dried flower wreaths were featured in *Southern Living* and *Martha Stewart Magazine*. His hand-made seashell wreath appeared on the cover of *Coast Monthly* magazine.



The Impressionist Moment

Mary Cassat. Anyone reading this article knows that Mary Cassat was a famous American impressionist artist of the mid nineteenth century. She was contemporary and acquaintance of so many well-known French impressionist artists: Monet, Manet, Corot, Degas, Pissarro, Boudin, Cezanne, Courbet, Matisse, Renoir, Sisley and on and on. We know of her so well because of her gender and her nationality, both of which made her an outlier and outstanding in the art world of that day.

Berthe Morisot is not so well known. She was the youngest of three sisters, Edma the middle sister, and Ives the eldest. All three were artists. Ives married early on and gave up her art aspirations. The other two, Berthe and Edma, were very close and were both very serious in pursuing art careers. They were both tutored by Eduard Manet, who was only a handful of years older. Eventually, Edma married and moved away from the family home in Paris to L'Orient on the Atlantic Coast.

This had a deleterious effect on Berthe, but never the less, she continued with her art career and made the decision to postpone marriage in pursuit of her art. She did eventually marry Eugene Manet, younger brother of Eduard Manet. They had one child, a daughter named Julie.

I learned of all of this through my research in preparation for an exhibit I had planned to see at the National Gallery of Art, much like someone would hone up on their French for a planned trip to Paris. The exhibit was called "Paris 1874: The Impressionist Moment." In that year, a group of artists decided to put on their own exhibition independent of the annual state curated exhibition known as the Académie des Beaux-Arts in Paris, aka "The Salon" exhibition. The annual Salon exhibition could, at the time, arguably be considered the greatest annual or biennial art event in the Western world! An artist's piece accepted for this exhibit. would launch a career. Being a state sponsored exhibition, the board of jurists were political appointees and consequently the art selection process was always tainted with a bit of the political which led to some censorship.

The group of artists who desired to put on an independent exhibition wanted to break free from this and, in 1874, they had their first independent exhibition which has become known as the first exhibition of impressionist art. The term "impressionist" was coined by an art critic in describing the style of art in this independent exhibition. And by the way, both Berthe and Edma had work accepted at this first "impressionist" exhibit.

The National Gallery of Art exhibition "Paris 1874: The Impressionist Moment" consisted entirely of paintings that were exhibited in 1874, either at the independent "impressionist" exhibit or at the state "salon" exhibit. It was only to be exhibited at two venues: The Musee d'Orsay in Paris or the National Gallery of Art in Washington D.C. I only learned of the exhibit after it had already been shown at the Musee d'Orsay and only just in time to see it on the LAST day in D.C., January 18.

But the backdrop to all of this and the years immediately preceding 1874 is the most interesting part of the story. Something that I never knew, but is well known in French history as that this period known as "L'Année Terrible" (The Terrible Year) August 1870 to July 1871. France had foolishly declared war on Prussia, lost every battle and Paris was besieged by the Prussian army. Many

Parisians and artists fled Paris before the siege. Berthe Morisat stayed. Eduard Manet stayed and joined the French National Guard in defense of Paris. There was hunger and deprivations but the Prussian army did not bombard Paris. A humiliating treaty was signed before bombardment became necessary. After the treaty was signed the real devastation of Paris took place and it was the French against French that caused this devastation. The treaty was deemed so humiliating to the Parisian populous that they formed their own government, barricaded streets, and became desirous of secession from France. Now the French army besieged Paris, starved its populace and bombarded the city. The Parisians burned much of Paris in their block-by-block retreat. Atrocities and mass executions were perpetrated by both sides.

Now, knowing this history, when I look at a French impressionist painting, or one by Berth Morisat or Eduard Manet, I pay attention to the date it was painted. Was it before or after the "L'Année Terrible"? When I contemplate an idyllic French landscape painting from this period or view a Parisian city scape painting from this period, the date has some significance.

One final observance: in the list of French impressionist painters I associated with Mary Cassat, were the painters who were involved in putting on that 1874 exhibition. Only Eduard Manet chose not to participate, thinking it might prove detrimental to his prospects.

Thanks to Leroy for this fascinating look at a significant period in art history. 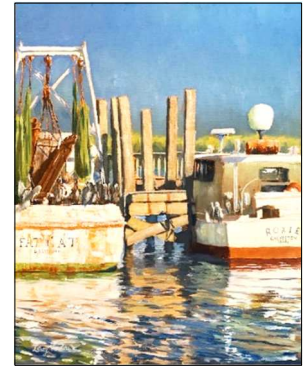
The Official 2025 Mardi Gras Poster!

The web is responsive so it will work on any platform (desktop, phone, iPad, PC, and Mac). It will also be controlled by a database, thus reducing errors. This gives the site better rankings on Google and allow us to have a much more sophisticated shopping cart for the purchase of art, workshops, and ticket sales.

BETTER IMAGES TO SHOWCASE YOUR WORK

Clickable images are much larger than before and other examples of your work are featured on the site. This is the perfect site for you to showcase your work. I advertise my work online through Facebook each month to increase my chances of sales and you, too, can as well. Thanks to those of you who submit your images. Currently only about 30-50% do. I encourage more of you to do this as it will result in a better image of your work on the site.

FILE NAMING NEEDS TO MATCH THE DATABASE

File naming is important. So that the database can properly translate your file names and match them to the images on Dropbox, you should rename your files with the following: First Name Last Name Title of Work.jpeg

That means:

No underscores

No punctuation such as periods or commas

No special characters such as ~ ! @ # \$ % ^ & * () ? > <

AND

You Must Use Initial Caps for the First Letter of Each Major Word

Email the image with its new title and actual size to gallery2117@gmail.com by midnight the day of changeover in a member show and by midnight the day after notifications go out for a juried show. **Please note:** You no longer need to put the measurements and price on the files. Thank you all for helping the new and improved site run smoothly.
